A couple of months ago, the Valley published its current schedule of degrees and other events for the first half of our year. The schedule included a couple of interesting changes that could get by you. For example, in the past the Valley has declared the months of June and July to be dark (that is, no stated meetings). The Valley would then meet in August, to begin preparations for the fall reunions and other programs. **THAT'S NOT HAPPENING THIS YEAR**.

As part of our planning strategy for VMAP, we scheduled this Spring Reunion to end with the 32nd degree on the fifth and last Wednesday in May. But we wanted to have a cap and ring ceremony as soon after that as possible, and that meant having a stated meeting for the Valley in June. That's right, in June, the first Wednesday in June. This meeting will be dedicated to the members of our Spring Reunion and their families as we formally present to them the symbols of their advancement to the rank of Master of the Royal Secret, their caps and rings. We will have a dinner, of course, at 6:30 PM, followed by the ceremony. Please come and join in the celebration!

We also discovered that our by-laws exclude any meetings for the Chapter of Rose Croix, the Lodge of Kadosh, and the Consistory in June, July, and August. Only the Lodge of Perfection has been meeting in August. I have agreed that we will be considering several changes to our by-laws, but in the meantime, **THERE WILL BE NO STATED MEETING IN AUGUST**. We will be dark this year in July and August. Instead, we are going to take an active part in the LOA-Shriners Picnic on August 12th. That picnic will start at 11 AM at the Elks Temple in Bremerton and will include all of the orders of the Masonic Family. By the way, if you have a kilt, wear it to the picnic.

That's where we are with our scheduling. Be at a stated meeting in June, on the first Wednesday. Send me an email on the first Wednesday in August, but please don't come to a meeting. You will be very, very lonely. See me at the picnic instead. And please don't forget to attend our Scholarship Presentation Dinner on Friday, May 25th. This will be another great event celebrating our Valley and its youth.


on Saturday, May 19th, The Supreme Council is sponsoring a televised fundraising program named "Celebration of the Craft". This program is being aired for the fifth time that I can remember and includes a Scottish Rite Talent display from 10 Brethren throughout the country who have been selected to be part of the show. One of these, by the way, is Brother Dillon Smith from the Seattle Valley who will be playing an electric guitar and singing. This program will start at 6:30 Eastern Time and will run for three hours. We will be showing the fundraiser starting at 3:30 PM, Pacific Time. We will be able to stay tuned for about one and half hours, until about 5 PM at the Temple at 5th and Warren. For those of you who cannot attend our session at 5th and Warren, you can tune into the Scottish Rite site on your computer and share in the entertainment and discussions. Remember, 3:30 to 6:30, Pacific Time.

As an introduction to the "Celebration of the Craft", the Valley of Bremerton will be hosting a luncheon on the 19th, starting at 1:30 P.M., luncheon at 3 PM. We will start with a discussion forum to work on several plans that we want to implement starting this coming July. For example, we have been asked, as one of five Valleys, to participate in an Orient program of all twenty-nine (29) degrees next spring. Each of the five Valleys selected will be assigned one of the terminal degrees and five of the other degrees to present next Spring. The leadership in our Valley- the officers, committee Chairmen, and honored men-have a great deal to consider concerning this program. At this writing, most of those with whom I have discussed this project are in favor of our best effort to show what we are doing in the Bremerton Valley. Indeed, we have a great deal to be proud of. Others may be reluctant because of the extra time and effort it will require. (Many of us having difficulty maintaining our program responsibilities as it is. Next year RW Kendall will be Grand Master, and many of our members have volunteered to assist Jim in his many objectives. Districts 3, 11, and 12 have become a major program resource for the Grand Lodge, and with good reason.) The LOA picnic has been announced for August 12th at the Bremerton Elks Club at 11 AM. The Venerable Master and the Knights of St. Andrew want to be an active part of that picnic, as an opportunity to add to our membership. Lots of topics to discuss. We need your help.

So, that's it. I would like to have as many of you as are available to attend our "Celebrating the Craft" luncheon at 1:30 PM on Saturday, the 19th at the Bremerton Temple. It will not be easy!!! That morning, Bremerton will be hosting an Armed Forces Day Parade that will start at 10 AM and run until about noon. The parade will make the Masonic Temple virtually inaccessible. You will have to plan to arrive at the Temple at about 1 PM to give the city a chance to clean up. At the same time many of you are participating in this and other parades in the area as members of the Shrine and in other groups. Like I said, getting there and being there will not be easy. But we need to see you there, to share your ideas, answer your questions, and be an active part of the Valley's voice. Who should attend? Any member of our Valley should attend, but especially the current elected officers, the committee chairmen, and the honored men (red and white hats). Let Chuck know if you will be available. No charge for lunch. We just want to make sure we have enough for everyone who shows. See you there.

If You Are Not a Mason

Before you can join the Scottish Rite, you first must become a Master Mason in a Lodge under a Grand Lodge that belongs to the Conference of Grand Masters in North America (COGMINA) or to a Grand Lodge *recognized* by a COGMINA Grand Lodge. For further information, contact your local Scottish Rite Body who can in turn assist you in finding the Masonic lodge nearest you.

If You Are a Blue Lodge Mason Interested in Learning about More Light in Masonry?

The Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry is commonly known as the *Scottish Rite*. It is one of several groups that are part of the worldwide fraternity known as Freemasonry.

The Scottish Rite is the largest and most widely practiced Masonic Rite in the world and employs a Lodge system.

It is our mission to improve its members and enhance the communities in which they live by teaching and emulating the principles of Brotherly Love, Tolerance, Charity, and Truth while actively embracing high social, moral, and spiritual values including fellowship, compassion, and dedication to God, family and country.

There is a lot More.

While there is no Masonic degree more important than that of Master Mason, there is a long tradition—almost as old as Freemasonry—of "high degrees" that expand upon and elaborate the teachings and lessons of the first three degrees. The Scottish Rite degrees teach a series of moral lessons culminating in the 32°, Master of the Royal Secret. The Scottish Rite continues a Master Mason's education in many ways:

- 4°-32° Degree work
- Speakers at meetings
- Leadership conferences
- Scottish Rite Journal
- Publishing Masonic books
- Scottish Rite Research Society

To join the Scottish Rite you must:

- be a Master Mason in good standing in a regular lodge;
- complete a petition and include the appropriate fee;
- attend a "Reunion" where the Scottish Rite Degrees are conferred.
- •

What are Supreme Council, Orients, and Valleys?

The governing body of the Scottish Rite is the Supreme Council. It is composed of active and deputy members of the 35 states and several overseas jurisdictions that make up the Southern Jurisdiction. Each state or jurisdiction that belongs to the Southern Jurisdiction is called an Orient. The local Scottish Rite body is called a Valley. Each Valley has up to four Scottish Rite bodies, and each body confers a set of degrees in the Southern Jurisdiction these are:

- Lodge of Perfection (4°–14°)
- Chapter of Rose Croix $(15^{\circ}-18^{\circ})$
- Council of Kadosh $(19^\circ 30^\circ)$
- Consistory $(31^\circ 32^\circ)$.

Overview

The Scottish Rite Master Craftsman (SRMC) program is an exciting, by-mail correspondence course designed and administered by staff at the House of the Temple in Washington, DC, under the guidance and leadership of the Supreme Council, 33°, of the A&A Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, USA. Upon completion of each program listed below, the participant will be rewarded with a medal or pins to denote multiple completions. Currently, there are three programs that are meant to be taken in the following order:

- **Program I:** *The Symbolic Lodge* will familiarize students with aspects of the development of Blue Lodge Masonry and explore some of its developing symbolism. This will reveal that the "High Degrees" began to develop soon after formation of the Premier Grand Lodge (1717). Albert Pike's book, Esoterika: The Symbolism of the Blue Degrees of Freemasonry, along with Arturo de Hoyos's Scottish Rite Ritual Monitor & Guide (3d ed.) will be used to demonstrate a rational and philosophical interpretation for much of what is found in Craft Masonry.
- **Program II:** *Scottish Rite Ritual and History* consists of six lessons, utilizing the *Scottish Rite Ritual Monitor & Guide* by Arturo de Hoyos, 33°, Grand Cross, and *A Bridge to Light* (4th ed.) by Rex Hutchens, 33°, Grand Cross, as its textbooks.
- **Program III:** *Scottish Rite Philosophy* uses *Albert Pike's Morals & Dogma, Annotated Edition*, by Arturo de Hoyos, 33°, Grand Cross and returns to the ritual of the Scottish Rite to re-explore it on a deeper level, by looking for the moral lesson imparted in each degree and then applying that lesson to one's everyday life. The course consists of 33 quizzes, grouped into 10 sections

Suggested Order of Programs and Their Associated Texts

1. **Master Craftsman: The Symbolic Lodge** (1°, 2°, 3°, using *Albert Pike's Esoterika: The Symbolism of the Blue Degrees of Freemasonry*)

- Master Craftsman: Scottish Rite History and Ritual (4°-32°, using the Scottish Rite Ritual Monitor & Guide and A Bridge to Light)
 Master Craftsman: Scottish Rite Ritual Monitor & Guide and A Bridge to Light)
- 3. Master Craftsman: Scottish Rite Philosophy (1°–32°, using *Morals and Dogma* and *A Bridge to Light*)

Master Craftsman Group Study

A group setting is far and away the best way to learn and experience all that these programs have to offer. This is simply because Freemasonry is not a solitary pursuit, but rather a social experience — we gather in Lodges together for a reason! In fact, social engagement while finding more light in Masonry can be (and often is) more rewarding than simply answering some questions about a reading assignment. This is because you are learning not only about yourself through the ritual and its symbolism, but about others and their unique relationship to the deep philosophies and mysteries that are contained in the material, too. A group can be as big or as small as you like. There are no minimum requirements to start a study group, and anyone can be the catalyst that starts one up. You also set the pace. Go as fast, or as slow as you would like. You can meet once a week or once a month. Your schedules will dictate the best calendar. It can also be as formal or as casual as you'd like. Does there need to be set meeting dates, or will you meet whenever everyone has finished the next reading assignment/quiz? Your meeting place can be someone's house, a conference room, or a comfortable booth in the neighborhood diner or tavern. The key with all of this is to have fun, and to engage each other about the meanings of Freemasonry and life itself. In fact, using that goal, finishing the programs becomes a distant second to connecting with other people who have similar interests and learning through more about each other through the shared experience of conversation and fellowship. To help the interested group seeker or leader, we have put together a short Group Leader Guide that helps navigate the logistics and details of forming a study group. If you are interested in this, please contact us and we will be happy to share it with you free of charge, and to assist you in any way we can with the formation and operation of your own study group.
